Director's Notes

"Godspell is a deceptively difficult show to direct", wrote Stephen Schwartz in his 'Godspell Script Notes and Revisions' in 1999. I think he must have meant "deceptively easy" because the script is just about the most unhelpful I have so far encountered in deciding the author's original intentions. However, a lot of reading and studying of it and various editions of The Bible plus the works of the late, great, Dr. William Barclay, listening to the music, and talking to and asking questions of a great many people, brought us to the conclusion that Godspell is about the formation of a number of very different characters into a community and teaching them about the Gospel. They then become followers of Jesus, and after his crucifixion carry these teachings out to the world.

So we were pleased to discover that we were on the right track when a friend downloaded the 'Script Notes etc' quoted above (and referenced below *) and only wish she had found them a bit sooner - it would have saved a deal of work! Schwartz writes: "...above all, the first act of Godspell must be about the formation of a community. Eight separate individuals, led and guided by Jesus (who is helped by his assistant, John the Baptist/Judas), gradually come to form a communal unit. This happens through the playing of games and the telling and absorbing of lessons, and each of the eight individuals has his or her own moment of committing to Jesus and the community. When Jesus applies clown make-up to their faces after 'Save the People', he is having them take on an external manifestation that they are his disciples, temporarily separating them from the rest of society.

"In the second act, after an opening number that continues the sense of playfulness and includes some good-natured teasing of Jesus by his followers, Jesus announces, 'This is the beginning'. By this he means that the community has now been formed, so that they are ready to move through the challenging series of events leading to the crucifixion. When Jesus removes their makeup, just prior to the Last Supper, he is saying that they have assimilated his teachings and no longer need the outward trappings that brand them as disciples. And when Jesus is taken from them at the end, the rest of the company remain fused as a community, ready and able to carry forth the lessons they have learned."

Godspell had its first production in New York in 1971, and was conceived and directed by John-Michael Tebelak, who set it in a "distinctly urban and gritty environment, resembling an inner city abandoned playground. All props and costume add-ons came out of garbage bags on stage or were hanging on the chain-link fence. Lighting was basic...in other words the emphasis was on simplicity or 'theatre of poverty'. Above all this was the sense of fun and beauty being created out of urban garbage".

The Players have adopted this idea in general. However, we have enlarged the cast (because in this vast space a small production becomes rather 'lost') by using the theme of the medieval 'mystery' or 'miracle' plays that once toured the ancient cities. So here you will see the touring company arriving at an approximation of our scenery and props shed, bringing some items with them and appropriating other bits and pieces that the find there to act out their performance. The idea is that at each venue another eight 'disciples' will answer John the Baptist's call to 'Prepare the Way', a new little community will be formed and go forth to fulfil their task, and the Company will move on to repeat the work.

As previously stated, this has been a difficult show to direct, but the experience has been richly rewarding. I think you will agree that this must be one of the finest collection of voices and talents ever to grace a Players show and it has been a privilege to work with them all. My special thanks to Jennifer Groom for bringing out the full beauty of this music, to Belinda Hassall for her evertain and good-humoured wizardry in moving people around, to Peter Smith, our 'director under nurture', to Patrick Helean for special input and advice, and to the entire cast for working so hard and performing so brilliantly.

Thanks to you, our audience, for supporting us. We hope the magic of Godspell will stay with you always.



Patrick Helean (Jesus)

This is Patrick's first appearance with the Queanbeyan Players, and, for that matter, in the Southern Hemisphere. He spent the last thirteen years with Prairie Fire Theatre (a touring youth theatre based in Minnesota USA) as an actor, director and for the last six years as Managing Director. He moved to the Canberra/Queanbeyan area because it is his wife's favourite place to be, and it's quickly becoming his as well.

Jonathan Garland (John the Baptist/Judas)

Jon is a soldier in the Australian Army. A former professional trombone player, he has been involved in the theatre in various guises for as long as he can remember. He has had roles in shows including The Crucible, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, From the Fourteenth Floor You Can See the Harbour Bridge and Can Can. Godspell is his second outing with the Players, following the acclaimed mediocrity of his performance of Farmer Carnes in Oklahoma.

Megan Baran

Megan has been acting for the past five years, but has been singing and dancing for only two. In 2000 she completed a twelve-month Musical Theatre course at the Ballarat Academy of Performing Arts, where she worked with Australian actors Don Bridges, Peter Tulloch and Mike Bishop. In 1998 Megan completed a Double Major in Drama at Erindale College, where she appeared as Fruma Sarah in Fiddler on the Roof, Katherine in The Child, and in her first lead role as Anna in The King and I.

Susan Camm

Most of Susan's singing experience has been with bands, both her own and other people's (for a total of eighteen years!). This is her second production with the Players, and her second production of Godspell. For the Players she performed the role of Anne in Half a Sixpence in 1990. In Year Twelve she played the part of John the Baptist in Queanbeyan High School's production of Godspell.

Cathy Cleary

Cathy has been performing with various theatrical and singing groups in minor principal roles in Canberra for nearly twenty years. However, this is her debut with the Queanbeyan Players. Cathy says that she has no excuse for not knowing the words, as she has previously sung songs from the show at weddings, and was also a soloist in the production of Godspell during her long time as a member of the Woden Valley Youth Choir. Cathy is enjoying the fact that she lives only five minutes away from rehearsals!

Ruth Crabb

Ruth works in the ACT Public Service and gets to say 'No' to people a lot. When not running around with local Christian youth activities, she is kept busy taming the disaster zone currently masquerading as her garden. Ruth is always ready for a debate or verbal joust. Godspell is her first theatrical outing.

Jamey Devine

Jamey is a relative newcomer to the stage with only minor roles dating back to primary school. However, he really enjoys the singing lessons he has been taking for the past year, and has sung at weddings. He also enjoys acting (if only he could remember his lines...) He is very much looking forward to performing in Godspell.



Louise Dolby

Louise's interest in theatre began in high school when she performed in the Karabar High productions of Sweet Charity and The Pajama Game, in which she performed the role of Poopsie. Her need for the limelight was filled by her position as Miss Queanbeyan Showgirl back in 1991. Since then she has returned to theatre with the Queanbeyan Players in The Sentimental Bloke, The Pirates of Penzance, Anything Goes, and L'il Abner.

Donna Duvall

Locally grown, bred and schooled, and now working in Queanbeyan, Donna is a Graphic Reproducer by trade. She appeared in school musicals years ago, including Dracula Spectacular (chorus), My Fair Lady (chorus), and Dazzle (Greaser and chorus). She continued singing in local bands, and recently in a local choir. This is her first show with the Queanbeyan Players. She was a Queen of Canberra entrant in 1991, and is generally an all-round nice person.

Stephen Hines

Stephen's first appearance in a musical was as Strephon in a high school production of Iolanthe. He then left the stage for eighteen years, until his mother persuaded him back as a member of the chorus in Canberra Philharmonic's One Enchanted Evening in 2000. Having enjoyed that, he went on to appear in the choruses of Queanbeyan Players' productions of Iolanthe and Oklahoma and CAMRA's Patience.

Felicity Hourigan

Felicity's first show with the Queanbeyan Players was Annie Get Your Gun. She then appeared in The Sorcerer and The Zoo, Fiddler on the Roof, The Pirates of Penzance, The King and I, and Iolanthe. She has been dancing since she was three years old. She sang in the Sing 2001 choir and also sang at the Opera House with the Queanbeyan East school choir. She is currently a Year Ten student at Queanbeyan High.

Alex Jordan

Alex was a member of the Ainslie Primary School choir from 1992 to 1998. He also appeared in Brigadoon in 1996. He is currently a student at Narrabundah College. He describes himself as the 'resident fool' of the Godspell cast, and might well be the only cast member to be told off in EVERY rehearsal. That's quite an achievement!

Shannon McNamara

Shannon has been involved in the performing arts in some way or another since she was eight years old. During this time she has participated in several musicals including The Pirates of Penzance (as Mabel), Robin the Hood (Maid Marion), The Sound of Music (Brigitte) and Bugsy Malone (Bangles). She was also the lead singer in a country band called the Tequila Slammers between 1993 and 1996. Her most memorable acting experience was winning the 1995 'Young Shakespearean of the Year' with her portrayal of Ophelia from Hamlet.

Lauren Nihill

Lauren has been singing since she was a young girl and is now teaching and singing professionally. Godspell marks a return to the Queanbeyan Players, and the theatre, after a seventeen-year absence. She is very excited to be a part of the show.

Stacy Nitschke

Godspell is Stacy's first show with the Queanbeyan Players, but she is no stranger to performing. She has been learning various forms of dancing for the past four years, including ballet, jazz and tap. She has also performed in two school productions, The Wiz and Guys and Dolls.

Warwick Pitt

Fame, Fiddler on the Roof, West Side Story and Cats are just a few of the musicals Warwick has neither seen nor performed in. After a successful role as a Roundhead in a 1984 production of All the King's Men, Warwick progressed to the Queanbeyan Players production of the King and I, where his multifaceted talents included playing the southern slope of a mountain.



Tony Retter

Tony, as the oldest fogy in the show, is still wondering why he's in Godspell - it's possibly due to his name and the misguided impression that parents of talented children are likely to be similarly talented. He has now been in six Queanbeyan Players musicals after having first been inveigled by Vivian Arnold ('it's only a walk-on part') for Fiddler on the Roof and then by Janetta McRae ('oh - we know you can sing') for The Pirates of Penzance. He remains optimistic that one day soon he really will be able to do two or more things at once.

Dim Ristevski

Dim was stunned to have landed a role in Godspell. His theatrical experience started with his first taste of amateur theatre in West Side Story with Supa, and he later played Pearce in Half a Sixpence with Phoenix Players. When asked how he felt, he replied, "I can't believe how much my life has changed since I got the ABTRONIC".

Richard Wade

Richard first appeared with the Queanbeyan Players in the lead male role of Strephon in Gilbert and Sullivan's lolanthe. Since then he has sung as the tenor soloist in Mozart's Requiem at Llewellyn Hall and performed in a lunchtime concert in Canberra City. This is Richard's second appearance with Queanbeyan Players.

Band

Kylie Groom - Guitar

Kylie, as a flute player, is no stranger to musical theatre, having played for several musicals including Brigadoon, Annie Get Your Gun and The Pirates of Penzance. However, since picking up an acoustic guitar Kylie has been reluctant to put it down, and she jumped at the chance to play for Godspell. Kylie also performs with all-girl covers duo Black Velvet and a new four-piece band.

Ewan Harwood - Keyboard

Already this year, Ewan has worked in some capacity with most of Canberra's musical theatre companies: Harlequin Theatre, Alpha, Phoenix Players, Canberra Philharmonic and Supa Productions. Last year, he was awarded Best Musical Director at the Canberra Area Theatre Awards for G-String Productions A Slice of Saturday Night. He is mildly surprised (and more than mildly blinded) to find the Godspell band - instead of hiding safely in the darkness of the pit - is in full view, with real, bright lights on them.

Peter McDonald - Bass

Peter is happy to be lining up for his eleventh Queanbeyan Players production. As one of the region's most adequate theatrical bass players, he also appears regularly with Supa, G-String, Alpha, Phoenix, The Southern Cross Players and the Southern Gungahlin Light Sousaphone Society.

Chris Neal - Lead Guitar

Chris has been involved in musical theatre behind the scenes for many years. This is Chris's second appearance playing guitar in a show, last playing in the pit for Bugsy Malone while still at school. Chris is currently fighting for the guitar solo in Fame.

Ron Tito - Percussion

Ron has been a part of every Queanbeyan Players musical since 1995 and has been hoping to play in Godspell since he saw it in Sydney when it opened. As well as the Queanbeyan Players Ron also plays with most of the other musical societies in the Canberra area. He has just finished a run of Me and My Girl and looks forward to Fame later this month.
