From the Director

When I heard Queanbeyan Players were looking for a director for *The Mikado*, I hesitated only 5 minutes before offering my services. It is one of my favourite Gilbert and Sullivan operettas and has played a large role in my life, being dragged to countless dress rehearsals by my mother, who was lead violin in many amateur productions across Sydney.

My partnership with *The Mikado* continued when, as a teenager, I began performing in the chorus, then worked my way up to play Yum-Yum, my first true leading role, when I was still young and charming. My most recent contact with *The Mikado* was in Wollongong in 1999, when I landed the wonderfully bubbly role of Pitti-Sing. As a result of all this immersion in *The Mikado*, I felt I had plenty of background history to direct this, the most loved and well-known of all the G&S operettas.

When I first began thinking how I would present this production, I was struck by the unusual juxtaposition of the exquisite musical score and the absurd storyline. I built on this "sublime/ridiculous" idea and decided to support the "quirky" plot with the most divine backdrop, both visually and musically.

I have been fortunate to work with the most fabulous team. John Batterham has been the most enthusiastic, competent and inspiring musical expert and has truly brought the written notes to glorious life. Any cast member will tell you John's warmups made it worth going to rehearsals on all those cold winter nights.




Gail Guiliano and Mary Bowron as Costume Creators have also contributed to making this production look magnificent.




Stage Manager - Leanne Lord

Simon and Imogen Wall – Production design

Simon and Imogen would like to thank Fiona and Queanbeyan Players for giving them their first chance at designing for a whole show. When Fiona said she wanted the set to be "exquisite – like a Japanese brush painting", they thought they'd take her literally and make the set a painting come to life. The Japanese theme of *The Mikado* inspired some very



enjoyable research into Japanese art, including several trips to the Japanese Garden at Cowra. Imogen and Simon love the friendly, community atmosphere of Queanbeyan Players and couldn't have done without the support, help and guidance of long-time Queanbeyan Players set guru Trevor Roach. They hope no one misses the grey stone pit cover too much!

The story

As the story begins, Nanki-Poo has fled the court of his father, the Mikado of Japan, and marriage to the elderly Katisha. Disguised as a musician, he has fallen in love with Yum-Yum, whose guardian, Ko-Ko, wishes to marry her himself.

Ko-Ko, escaping a death sentence by becoming the executioner himself, receives a letter from the Mikado demanding he execute someone or lose his position. When Nanki-Poo seems bent on suicide because he cannot marry Yum-Yum, Ko-Ko agrees to let him marry her for a month in exchange for public execution at the end of that time. The solution is marred only by the arrival of Katisha, who threatens to go to the Mikado.

Things begin to go seriously wrong when Ko-Ko discovers a law that wives must be buried alive upon the death of their husbands. They come up with a new solution — a false affidavit that the death has taken place.

The Mikado arrives and, on hearing of the execution of his son, condemns Ko-Ko and his accomplices to death. Their only hope is to admit to the false affidavit but, as Nanki-Poo has already married Yum-Yum, Katisha will surely insist on their deaths.

Ko-Ko solves the problem in the only way he is able – by offering his hand to Katisha – and the show ends with "joyous shouting and ringing cheers".


David Cannell as Ko-Ko

Jane Barban understudying Yum-Yum




